Taken from Mrs. Charles E. Cowman's "Streams in the Desert," Vol. Two

"Therefore all things whatsoever ye would that men should do to you, do ye even so to them," (Matthew 7:12).

This universal language is the *language* of *action*. I understand that you have a kind heart, because your kindness takes shape in a friendly letter or deed – I can *see* your kindness. I understand how much you love your family because your love for them takes form in hard working devotion to their needs. In the same way we come to know the Love of God. For long centuries God in His wisdom spoke

to men through words, on the lips of prophets and priests and sages and saints, and men could not be sure what God was like. Then when they were ready, He spoke to them in a new way: 'And the Word was made flesh, and dwelt among us, and we beheld His glory, full of Grace and Truth.' God's Love took form in a Life which we could see, in a death upon a Cross which we beheld; and ever since then, men have said, 'God is like Jesus Christ. God's Love is like the Cross.' This was the 'Incarnation,' taking shape in flesh before the eyes of people. God has spoken, at last, in the universal language of action!

George Washington, one day, had a tempting opportunity to preach a sermon on loving your neighbor. He was riding across the farmlands with a company of gentlemen, when the last horse over a stone fence knocked over a number of stones, leaving a large opening. Washington suggested that they stop and repair it, but the others shrugged their shoulders; so he said nothing more, and rode on with them. When the party disbanded, one of them, riding homeward, found Washington back in the farmer's fence, carefully replacing the stones, 'Oh, General,' chattered the man, 'You are too big a man to be doing a thing like that.' 'No,' answered Washington, aravelv inspecting his work, 'I'm just the right size.' Washington was preaching his sermon in the universal language of action. Words would have bored the farmer no end, but the deed of neighborliness spoke for itself.

A Word From Pastor Zach

you grew up in church or have been going for a while, most of us know the answer to this trivia question: What is the shortest verse in the Bible? It's John 11:35 – "Jesus wept."

However, did you know that this is only one of two places in Scripture where our Savior cried? The other place where He wept was in Luke 19:41. The passage says, "As He approached and saw the city, He wept for it..."

It is actually really interesting to contrast these two passages. In John 11, Jesus is going to visit Lazarus' tomb. We know that He is going to raise Lazarus from the dead. And yet, though He knows that miracle is coming, He still weeps. On the surface, it might seem like Jesus has the same reaction to Lazarus' death that He does to Jerusalem. However, when we dig a little deeper, we see there is a stark difference between how Christ "weeps" in these two passages.

In the original Greek, there are two different words used for "wept." In Luke 19, the word used for weep is *klaio*. This type of weeping is best described as crying aloud in anguish. Interestingly enough, this is the type of weeping that we see Mary and others have in Luke 11:33 as they mourn the loss of Lazarus. Jesus is mourning over Jerusalem because He knows, in AD 70, that Jerusalem will be sieged and overthrown.

In John 11, the word for "weep" is dakryo. This words means that He wept silent tears, best described as tears of compassion. In other words, it

seems like in John 11, Jesus is crying not out of anguish, but He is full of compassion for the grief that Lazarus' friends and family are dealing with. Jesus cares about them, so He weeps. However, His crying isn't marked with anguish. Instead, He knows what is going to happen with Lazarus. He knows that a resurrection is coming!

Why was Jesus' weeping so different in these two passages? Because, in both situations, Jesus knew what was coming. In Luke 19, Jesus is in anguish over Jerusalem because He knows that the city is full of people who will not repent and trust in Him. When the city is destroyed, He knows the eternal implications of its residents. He is heartbroken over their impending demise.

When it comes to Lazarus, Jesus has compassion for those who are mourning. He knows that they are heartbroken for Lazarus in the same way that He was devastated for Jerusalem. However, He isn't heartbroken Himself. He knows that Lazarus will be restored to life and that the mourning of his family and friends will turn to joy.

So Jesus wept...twice! But He was only truly heartbroken for those who didn't have the hope of eternity with Him.

Let me close with this last question. What breaks your heart? It is evident by contrasting these two passages that Christ's heart breaks over the lost. Will you join me in praying that we have the same burden for the lost in our city?

Hymns Written During Past Pandemics - Part III - By Dr. Julie Barrier, Crosswalk.com

James Montgomery, born in 1771, was a Scottish-born hymn writer and poet. He wrote 400 hymns in the midst of controversial quarantines for yellow fever, cholera, and bubonic plague. *Sing Hallelujah, Sing* is one of his most famous. What a statement of faith!

"Sing Hallelujah, Glory to God alone...Bring your thank-offerings to the throne. The Lord put forth His hand. He touched us and we died. Vengeance went through the land, but mercy walked beside. He heard our prayers; He saw our tears and stayed the plague and quelled our fears."

Dr. John Ryland was an English Baptist pastor and a close friend of John Newton, composer of *Amazing Grace*. The deadly Cattle Plague was similar to smallpox, but even more deadly. This plague ravaged Britain and other parts of Europe. Ryland paraphrased Psalm 139 into lyrics for his hymn, *Sovereign Ruler of the Skies*.

"He that formed me in the womb shall guide me to the tomb. All my times shall ever be ordered by His wise decree...Plagues and death around me fly 'til He bids I cannot die. Not a single shaft can hit 'til the God of love thinks fit."

Swiss pastor Ulrich Zwingli (1484-1531) was one of the most influential voices in the Protestant Reformation. Black plague broke out in Zurich and he raced to minister to the sick. Zwingli caught the dreaded disease and almost died. But the hymn he wrote gives us an inspiring glimpse of his faith. The first four verses of his hymn were penned when the disease struck. Verses five through eight were written as his health deteriorated. Verse nine through twelve were written after God healed him. What a great model for us as we fight sickness:

"Help me Lord, my strength and rock, Lo at the door I hear death's knock. Lift up Your arm once pierced for me, that conquered death and rescued me. Yet if Your voice in life's midday recalls my soul, then I obey."

During his illness: "My pains increase, haste to console; for fear and woe seize body and soul. Death is at hand, my senses fail, my tongue is dumb, now Christ prevail. He (Satan) harms me not - I fear no loss. For here I lie beneath the cross."

After his recovery: "My God! My Lord! Healed by your hand, upon the earth once more I stand. Let sin no more rule over me - my mouth shall sing alone to Thee. Though now delay, my hour will come - involved perchance in deeper gloom. BUT LET IT COME, MY JOY WILL RISE. And bear my yoke straight to the skies."

What a picture of handling suffering!
